National Night Out events planned for next week in Ark City

Kickoff party will start at 6 p.m. Monday in Paris Park; block parties Tuesday

ARKANSAS CITY, Kan. (October 2, 2015) — The Arkansas City Police Department will be host to its annual National Night Out (NNO) celebration next week, starting with a kickoff party on Monday night.

The party will be from 6 to 8 p.m. at Paris Park and the Agri-Business Building, 712 W. Washington.

Then, from 7 p.m. to nightfall Tuesday, a total of 19 block parties will be held throughout various Arkansas City neighborhoods. All of these events are open to the public.

National Night Out is an event celebrated in communities throughout the United States and on military bases all across the world. It is an event for neighbors to show their support for each other and take a symbolic stand against crime in their area. This will be the 32nd annual National Night Out.

The kickoff party will be a carnival-like atmosphere with an inflatable playground. There will be an Ident-a-Kid booth and many vendors. A disc jockey will provide entertainment, and free hamburgers and hot dogs will be provided by the Optimists of Arkansas City and Creekstone Farms Premium Beef.

There will be snow cone machine and popcorn machines. Cowley College student-athletes will lead positive, healthy activities for children who attend, including a 68-foot inflatable obstacle court.

The Arkansas City Fire-EMS Department will have an ambulance and its aerial platform on site, as well as a safety trailer, Sparky the firefighting Dalmatian and Freddy the robot fire truck.

“Clear your calendar, come out and join the community in fighting against crime and drugs, and enjoy the festivities,” said ACPD Officer Chase Hobart, NNO coordinator and school resource officer.

National Night Out is designed to:

- heighten crime and drug prevention awareness;
- generate support for, and participation in, local anti-crime efforts;
- strengthen neighborhood spirit and police-community partnerships;
- send a message to criminals, letting them know neighborhoods are organized and fighting back.

While National Night Out normally is held in early August, an alternate date in October is provided for communities that wish to have their events in cooler weather. Arkansas City has observed in National Night Out in October since 2011.

National Night Out is an annual community-building campaign that promotes police-community partnerships and neighborhood camaraderie to make our neighborhoods safer, better places to live.
